COMMUNITY USHERED REGIONAL EFFORT IN HEALTH CARE IN NORTH EAST INDIA (CURE, North East, Phase III)

INTRODUCTION

The "Community Ushered Regional Effort in Health Care in North East India (CURE, North East) (Health Project Phase iii)" is a three-year project which began in the year 2009 and is being funded by Misereor and Kinder Mission. It is being implemented in 40 villages falling under Ri-Bhoi districts of Meghalaya, India. The project is being implemented through the Health Centres run by the Catholic Church. There are 40 villages with 40 Village Health Workers and 5 health centres with 5 trained nurses supervising the work.

GOAL

Promotion of safe motherhood and child health and enhance community competency towards malaria management in 254 remote villages in Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram in North East India through participatory and people led preventive and curative health care measures.

OBJECTIVES

- To increase the rate of institutional delivery and the number fully immunized children up to the age 2 years in 254 villages by September 2019
- To reduce the occurrence of Malaria in the project operational villages through preventive and curative measures in 254 project villages by September 2019
- To make the Health Facilitation Centers (HFC) functional with great relevance in order to reach their service to at least 60% of the population by September 2019.

issues, preventive method, treatment facilities available and immunisation.

- Village level orientation on MCH cum nutritional camp: 822 women participated. The participants were made aware on communicable diseases, ANC, PNC & Immunization. Free Health Check up and Medicine were given to those in need.
- **Training Programmes:** Training on MCH and Maternity Benefits, **Emergency** care, ANC, PNC, Hand wash and Nutritional camps were conducted for VHW, ASHA and women. There were 270 participants. The participants were impart knowledge on ANC, PNC, Balance diet, Neo-natal care and Maternity benefit scheme and mean to access them. 283 community people were educated on the importance of cleanliness in the community to prevent diseases especially communicable and waterborne diseases
- Awareness Programmes: Awareness programme was held on First Aid, cancer and HIV AIDS, in which 351 participants were enlightened and benefitted from the programme.
- Public Consultation Meeting: A consultation meeting was held with PHC and other Stake holder, at the Conference Hall, Civil Hospital Ri Bhoi District. A brief presentation was made on our work and achievements. This was followed by discussion along with the DMHO as the Chief Guest on collaborated and net working with the government and the Health Facilitation Centre (HFC).
- ► Health Awareness seminar for Adolescent Girls: 643 participants were made aware on the impact of early marriages, importance of Hygiene, physical and emotional changes and Personal discipline.











- Malaria detection and awareness camp: 727 participants were sensitized on the preventive measures, available facilities and motivate to seek treatment.
- Training/Orientation on role of VHTFs/VHSNC/HCC: Members of HCC, VHSNC and VHTFs were sensitized on their roles and responsibilities through the meetings. Village Health Action Plans were discussed.
- Diocesan Level Review Meetings: Quarterly Implemented activities were reported and reviewed, challenges, achievements were shared and action plan prepared.
- Doctor's visit to health facilitation centre and health camp: 539 Participants were made aware on communicable diseases, ANC, PNC & Immunization. Free Health Check up and Medicine were given to those in need.



Awareness Programme on Tuberculosis:
779 community people and 267 students were sensitized about TB, preventive measures, course of treatment with focus on adherence to medication. Groups discussion was held with TB patients to motivate them to adhere to medication, to overcome emotional disturbance because of the illness through effective coping mechanism and understanding of illness. 28 participants were present.

Highlights of Achievements:

● **Distribution of Cloths and Food items:** The office of SSC distributed clothes and food items to people coming from poor families in all the 40 project villages. This was made possible through the generous contribution and donation from various Parishes and Individuals as part of the celebrations of World Day of the Poor in Shillong Archdiocese.





• Observation of International Women's Day: 300 women participated at the International Women's Day at Marmain. Most Rev. Dominic Jala, Archbishop of Shillong was the Chief Guest. The Assistant Director of Social Welfare sensitised the women on various schemes for women from the social welfare department. Discussions were held on the Act and Legislation on women, health scheme, common myth and misconception about Health and treatment facilities of government. The women presented various performance to grace the occasion.

Success Story:

Mrs. Asthalina Masharing, a mother of two children, was suffering from Arthritis with inflammation for the past eight month. She received treatment from several hospitals but no improvement. Through home visit by the supervisor and the VHW she was convinced to take treatment from Health Centre. She was brought to the Health Centre unable to stand or walk

on her own. Admitted in the health centre for 2 weeks under Acupressure treatment from Sr. Helen Thongni. After discharge from the Health Centre, she is able to come for follow up once a week by herself.





FACILITATING AGRICULTURAL REGENERATING MEASURES (FARM) NORTH EAST PHASE-II

Introduction:

FARM NE – II is a three year project which began in August 2016, being funded by Misereor Germany. The project is being implemented in the 9 villages of East Khasi Hills District of Meghalaya. The project is being implemented through Programme Coordinator, two Field Animators and one Accountant.

Goal:

Empowering community action leading to revival of traditional socio- economic, governance and health systems for achieving greater self-reliance of communities.

Strategies:

The project focuses on integrated approach to development with special focus to promotion of traditional agriculture good practices, traditional governance, collective action for socio-economic development and promotion of traditional health practices. In all these People Led Development/Empowerment approach is the lead strategy. In this project, communities' collective action for promotion of health practices, agriculture practices, traditional governance and good social practices is taken into account more than the individual gains.

This Program adopts People Led Development Approach to implement the project activities at village level. People are the main actor and the project staffs are the facilitators.

based support and encouragement were provided for the people to strengthen People Led Development / Approach in all the Farm villages.





Workshop sustainable on **agricultural practices:** In order to enhance our farmers on sustainable agricultural practices, various awareness programmes, trainings and workshops on production of cost effective and eco-friendly agricultural inputs, promotion of organic farming and kitchen garden, production pollinated of open seeds, preparation of bio-pest repellent,



scientific and improved traditional methods of farming were conducted with the help of experts from various departments.

- ▼ Village level workshop on livelihood activities: A bakery training programme for school dropouts youth of all the farm villages was organized at Rapleng, with the aim to facilitate them to better livelihood especially during agricultural off season. Ten farmers from Mawmuthoh formed a group to carry out livelihood promotion activities. Youths from Rapleng and Mawpyrshong villages formed Youth Groups to maintain and carry out developmental activities in the village.
- Workshop on combating alcoholism, early marriage and superstition: The Workshop was conducted for students of Good Shepherd Higher Secondary School, Jongksha on the evil of alcoholism, drug addiction and early marriage.
- Indigenous Food Fest / Kisan Melas: Identification and strengthening of traditional food resources (wild edibles, vegetables with medicinal properties etc) through promotion through indigenous food







festivals or Kisan Melas. The youth of all the nine villages were involved in the food fest. Varieties of local traditional wild edibles were brought at the melas.

Soil Health Card: Facilitating the village community for availing the Soil Health Card through soil testing. Farmers from Mawmuthoh village received the Soil Health Card.

Identification and Registration of Traditional Healers: Through baseline survey, ten traditional medical practitioners were identified from the project villages. Three

genuine traditional healers have been registered with the KHADC in the prescribed format of the Council. The traditional healers were facilitated to keep a record of the patients they treat and identification of botanical names of herbs used by them.

Celebrations of World Environment
Day: The World Environment Day was
celebrated at Good Shepherd Higher
Secondary, Jongksha, with the theme,
"Connecting People to Nature." Six
schools of the area were invited for the
programme. Shri. Remington Pyngrope,
the then Local MLA was the Chief Guest.





The schools walk in procession along with banners on environmental issues. The students were made aware through talks and presentation on the need to preserve the environment. On this day, the School for Herbal Medicine was launched. There was tree plantation and distribution of fruit tree saplings to farmers.

Highlights of some of the Achievements:

- People Led Approach was adopted for constructing compost bin at Namlang Village. Through PLD, Jongksha A became one of the cleanest villages under Mawkynrew Block.
- Farmers' Clubs of Rapleng were given training on mushroom cultivation. After the training, 200 packets of mushroom









have been ordered to be cultivated by the farmers club to enhance their income. At present the farmers are selling their product.

 Promotion of wild edibles: Through a workshop on wild edibles with the youth of all the project villages, where identification of wild edibles has been made, and through indigenous food fest, we have been able to bring back to some of the forgotten wild edibles for consumption.

- Bringing back ancestral millet to life: The Social Service Centre organised workshop and cooking demonstration on millet. As a consequence, 22 Farmers started cultivating millet. Millet which has been a forgotten crop has been brought back to life. Nutritional Analysis of finger millet done.
- ▼ Enhancing the herbal garden through volunteerism: The herbal garden of one of the traditional medical practitioners has been modified, cleansed and fenced with nameplates of 14 herbs identified with botanical names, with the help of volunteering youth from the village.







School on Traditional Health practices and use of Herbal Medicines: In order to impart knowledge on traditional medicine to the younger generations, traditional healers were invited to impart their knowledge on students at identified schools once a month.

Success story:

Namlang Village: Through the initiative of



the village headman, the community people of Namlang village are making all effort to make their village as one of the cleanest villages of the area. Through PLD, their effort has been enhanced by the







construction of a compost bin for disposing waste from the village. The compost bin was inaugurated by Shri. Banteidor Lyngdoh, Local MDC.

◆ After bakery training a youth form Rapleng took up bakery as a profession. He went for further training with the support of the Social Service Centre. Now he is earning and improved his livelihood from bakery.

LIVELIHOOD INTERVENTION FACILITATING ENTREPRENEURSHIP (LIFE)

Introduction:

Livelihood Intervention and Facilitating Entrepreneurship (LIFE) project covers 18 blocks, under Non Intensive approach. The overall focus under Non Intensive blocks is to create a readiness of the SHGs and other high level federations for quick and quality adoption under NRLM in its course of implementation. The main thrust area was engagement of NGOs as partners in the implementation of various activities related to social mobilization, livelihood promotion and other beneficial activities with the poor people in the rural areas as described in the Guidelines of LIFE Project. The main activities of the partner NGO is mobilization of formation of new SHGs and revival of existing ones, to provide trainings to SHGs, facilitating SHGs bank linkages, facilitating Revolving Fund to deserving SHGs and skilling of SHGs through convergence. The Social Service Centre signed an MOU with the Meghalaya State Rural Livelihood Society (MSRLS) for the implementation of LIFE project at Mawryngkneng Block.

Aim and objective:

The aim to Livelihood Intervention and Facilitating Entrepreneurship (LIFE0 project is universal social mobilization. That is to bring all poor women into the fold of SHGs. To fulfill this objective, it requires mobilization of formation of news SHGs and the transformation of all defunct and inactive SHGs to active, functional ones and includes them within LIFE fold.

Through these sessions the patients experienced support and encouragement to adhere to the treatment regime.

Highlights of Achievements:

- ► Nutritional support to Vulnerable Tuberculosis patients: The Social Service Centre as one of the implementing agencies of RNTCP, is providing free nutritional support of vulnerable MDR tuberculosis Patients. The total numbers of beneficiaries was 64, 7 patients cured, 22 patients have increasing in weight.
- ▼ Visit to TB Hospital: As part of the celebrations of World Day of the Poor, the Director and Staff of SSC visited TB hospital and provided free distributions of clothes and nutritional food items to all the patients.
- Celebration of World TB Day: The Social Service Centre celebrated World TB Day along with the patients who received nutritional support from the organization. The programme was held on the 22nd March 2018. Dr. Gautam (UN Observer) was the Chief Guest and Dr. Jenny Kharwanlang from TB Hospital was the Guest of honour. Dr. Gautam expressed his gratitude







to the Social Service Centre being the only NGO that provide nutritional support to MDR TB patients. On this day two patients witnessed of being cured of TB with the nutritional support given by the Social Service Centre. The patients were provided nutritional food items and free distribution of clothes.

Objectives:

To reach out to every citizen of the State and support he or she in improving him or her income by providing whole chain intervention in any of the 11 missions identified as livelihood sectors 1. Aquaculture, 2. Apiculture, 3. Sericulture, 4. Horticulture, 5. Agriculture, 6. Tourism, 7. Forestery and Plantation, 8. Energy, 9. Water, 10. Mission organic, 11. Mission green.

Project Area: Mawkynrew Block, Mawryngkneng Block and Shella Bholaganj Block.

Highlights of Activities:

Awareness Programme: Series of awareness programme were conducted on Traditional herbal medicine, bank linkages, poultry and piggery farming, tree plantation, DDUGKY scheme and formation of Farmers Producers Organistion.

- Trainings and Workshops: Various trainings and workshops were held on participatory value chain strategy for bee keepers, vermin compost, creation of nursery bed, disease and pest management, crop management, apiculture and value change strategy.
- Livelihood Promotion Programme: In order to strengthen the livelihood activity of the community people, training programme were held mushroom cultivation, poultry and piggery farming, value chain of bay leaf and coffee plantation. Linkages with ICAR and other Governments departments were provided for the community people in order to access various government schemes.
- Free Health Camp by Traditional Healers: The camp was held at Mawryngkneng Block in which 13 Traditional Healers took part in providing check up and distribution of medicines.





WORKSHOP FOR RURAL YOUTH ON FOOD SECURITY

A Workshop for Rural Youth on Food Security and the Promotion of Underutilized Indigenous Food Resources for Achieving Food and Nutrition Security was organized by the Social Service Centre (SSC), Shillong at Jongksha village under Mawkynrew block. This workshop was sponsored by the Government of Meghalaya under the Voluntary Action Fund 2016-17 of East Khasi Hills District, through the District Planning Officer, East Khasi Hills District. This workshop brought around 100 youths from 4 villages Jongksha, Rapleng, Mawblang and Laitdiengsai.



Objective

The workshop focuses on the need to create awareness among young minds regarding the importance of local food resources for better food and nutrition security. It was facilitated with the help of a participatory tool called Visualization in participatory Programme (VIPP). The two exercises namely; seasonality calendar and individual dietary diversity survey helped young people to increase their knowledge on the available local food products and as a consequence to compare the same to their eating habits.



Outcome

At the end of the workshop, everyone realized the negligence of their own local indigenous food which has more nutrients in content and easily available. Each youth present at the workshop took a resolution by initiating a change in their food habit and decided consume more of their own local indigenous food and to maintain a balanced diet in their everyday life. The



programme concluded with a note that "When people start consuming more of their own local food, malnutrition can be dealt to a large extent."







DISASTER RELIEF PROGRAMME IN COLLABORATION WITH STATE DISASTER MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY

Introduction

The State of Meghalaya as a whole is prone to quite a number of hazards and vulnerable to two major Natural Calamities, Earthquake and Incessant rainfall followed by series of Cyclone which has become an annual phenomenon and often associated with landslide, hailstones and flood. In this context the organization is taking a great step to organize the awareness programme indifferent places. The Social Service Centre in collaboration with the State Disaster Management Authority and the Department of Civil Defence and Home Guard, has been creating awareness, particularly among students with regard to natural disasters, in the following schools:

- Students were taught both theory and practical on the do's and don'ts in care of any disaster, particularly earthquake. They were also demonstrated on First Aid and safety measures, rescue operation and how they should behave in case of an earthquake in case of natural disaster, such as earthquake.

Success Story

■ Relief materials to Families: Being involved in natural disaster activities, the Social Service Centre has provided assistance in terms of relief materials to three families in this financial year, who suffered due to the outbreak of fire in their house.





REGIONAL ACTION FOR INITIATING SAFETY AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN, NORTH EAST INDIA (GENDER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME)

GOAL:

Women in North East India will have enjoyed social inclusion through partnership building and advocacy.

Objectives:

- To institutionalize Gender Concept in all levels of interventions in 15 Diocesan Social Service Societies (DSSSs) of North East India by June 2017
- To form and strengthen Parish, Level Women Advocacy platforms and to federate them at Diocesan and Regional level in order to address the women related issues by June 2017
- To capacitate women led Community Based Organizations(CBOs) coordinated by DSSSs to access Projects and Schemes from Government Departments by June 2017.

Highlights of Activities:

Programme on Leadership for Women: The training Programme on Leadership for Women was held on 14th May 2017 at Pomlakrai, East Khasi Hills District.
